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- Zimbabwe has three **International Airports** - Harare, Victoria Falls and Bulawayo
- Our **Seasons** - Summer September - May / Winter June - August / Wet Season November - February
- Best time to visit - The dry Months May to October
- Currency / power - **US Dollars** in small denominations
- Historical context - Formerly a British Colony Rhodesia. Independence in 1980 becoming Zimbabwe
- Security context - Extremely safe. One of the safest in Africa and was listed recently as such.

Access Information

- Inbound flights : Fastjet/Airlink/Air Namibia/Emirates/Ethiopian/Kenya Airways/Air Zimbabwe.
- Local private charters available
- Key airport hubs - Harare and Victoria Falls. Bulawayo is smaller with limited flights.
- Visa policy - Most visas paid in \$ available at international airports on arrival. Some require online application.
- Child Policy - Majority facilities offer under 12 half price. Unabridged birth certification required.
 - If travel with only one parent certified letter of authorization is required.
 - Very wild and remote camps and lodges have a no child policy.
- Most major credit cards are accepted at hotels, but not American Express. Advisable to carry US\$ cash in smaller denominations for day to day purchases, treats and gratuities.
- Insurance/medical - International, full medical insurance essential
- Malaria prophylactics advised in malaria areas.
- Covid protocols - Stringent at airport arrivals/accommodations and facilities. Arrival policy of PCR testing (48hrs)

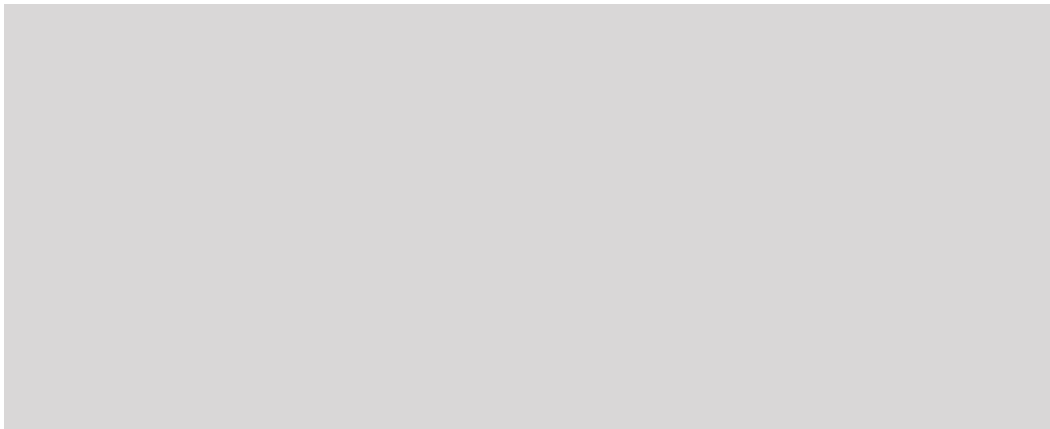


How to Sell Zimbabwe

Hidden Gems



Zimbabwe might be known for Victoria Falls, but she is also home to some of Africa's best kept secrets. These include:

- Hwange national park bigger than Belgium! One of the last refuges of huge herds of big game like elephants and buffalo and +/- 450 different species of birds.
- Zambezi National Park - a little gem of a park above Victoria Falls, bordering Botswana and Chobe
- Chilojo Cliffs. Off the beaten track and very wild and rugged. Very untouched.
- Chimanimani and Eastern Highlands - Scotland in Africa! Mountains and mist and unique flora and fauna.
- Gonarezhou and Save Valley in the lower south east of the Country. The land of Cliffs and Elephants.
- Mapungubwe and Tuli - A stark moonscape of baobabs and epic battles of a bygone era. Dinosaurs roamed here and there is evidence to prove it. Unique wildlife that has adapted to the harsh arid terrain.

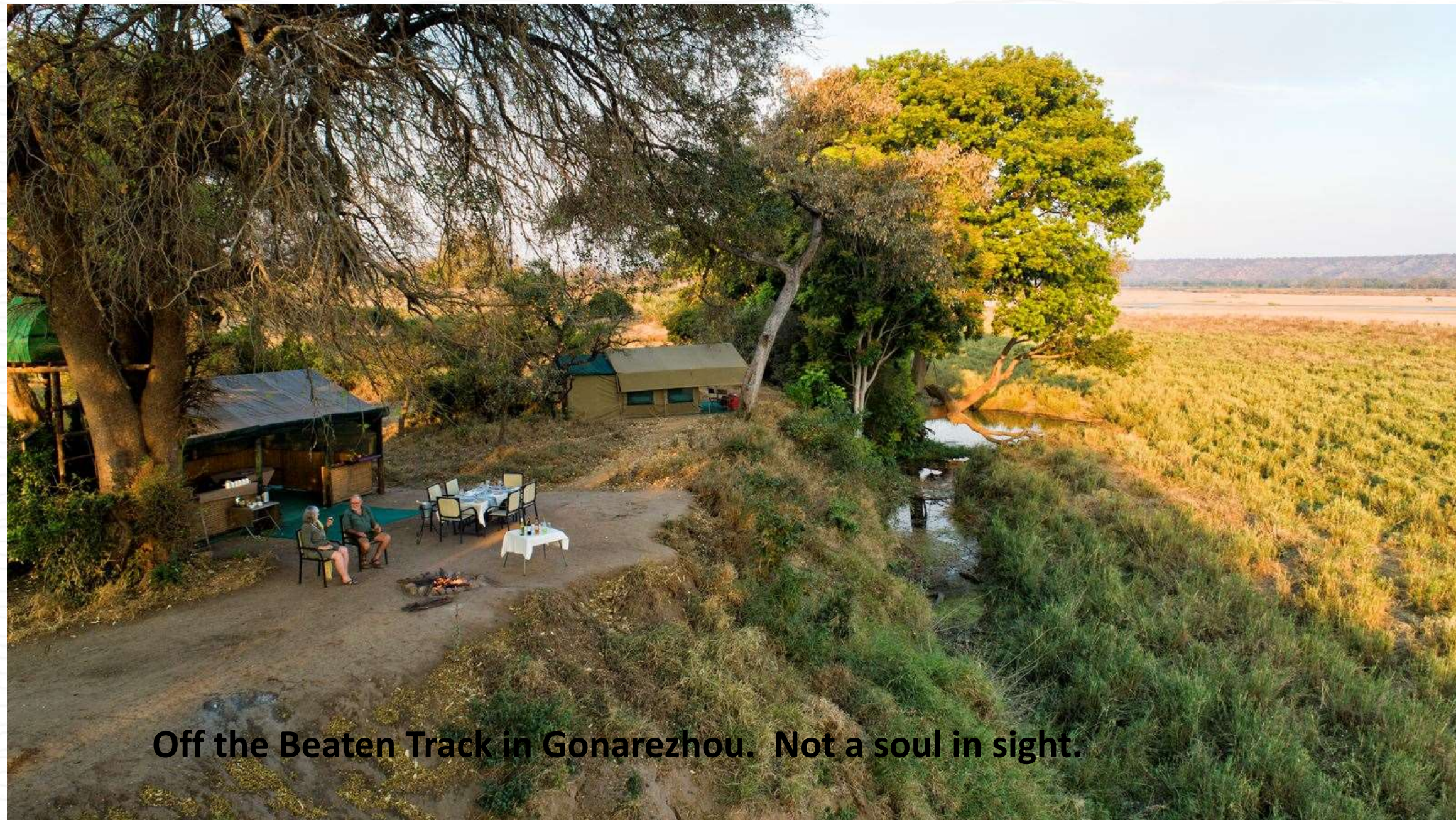

Hidden Gems

Zimbabwe might be known for Victoria Falls, but she is also home to some of Africa's best kept secrets.

- Matopas and Bulawayo - Bulawayo is Zimbabwe's 2nd city and an architectural gem. Matopas is a profusion of granite boulders and caves. Inhabited 26000 years ago by the San Bushman and now home to the rare and magnificent Black Eagle and white and black rhino.
- Mana Pools and Lower Zambezi - One of Africa's little Edens teaming with abundant wildlife. Life springs forth from the Zambezi River and the mauve "Mana Light" is sought by photographers worldwide
- Kariba - Zimbabwe's very own Ocean. The perfect blend of water and wildlife, houseboats, sunsets and epic tiger fishing.
- Great Zimbabwe and Lake Mtirikwe. The House of Stone. Incredible ruins of a lost civilization of kings and traders. Once a thriving city dating back to the 12th Century. Lake Mtirikwe is possibly the prettiest Lake in Zimbabwe. Built to irrigate the sugar cane plantations 200km away in Triangle and Chiredzi.

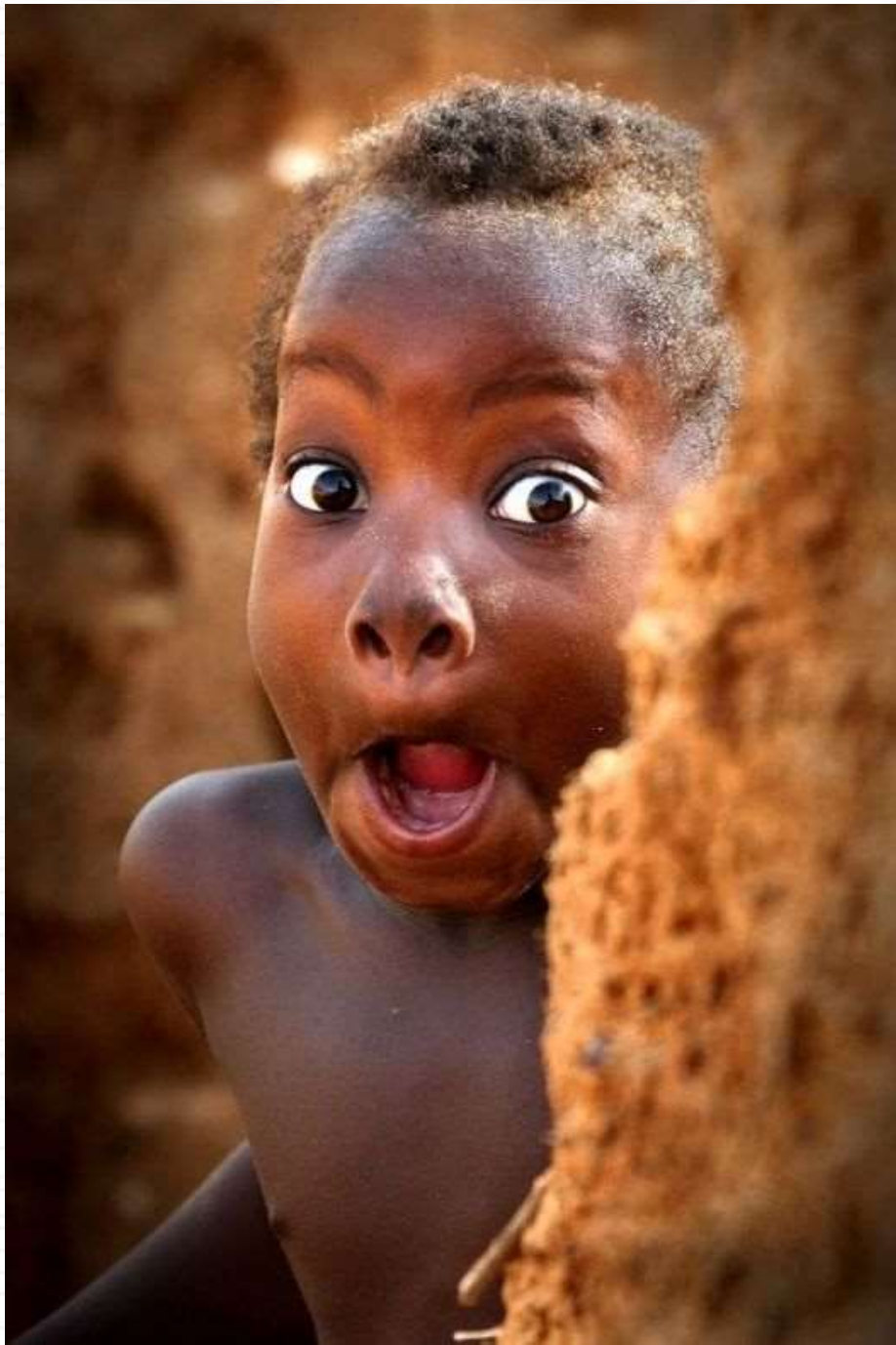
